Overview of the Museum Facilities





Memorial Museum of Important Cultural the Fifth High School Property

Location: Kurokami North Campus

This building was completed in August 1889 and used to conduct as a classesroom building for the Fifth High School. It has a masonry structure made of bricks and mortar, with a Western-style design. Its construction was led by the national government; two engineers from the Ministry of Education, namely Hanroku Yamaguchi and Masamichi Kuru, supervised its design and construction. It is one of the oldest high school buildings based on the old system









Engineering Faculty Location: Kurokami South Campus

Important Cultural

This building was constructed in 1908 as a student machine shop for the former Kumamoto Technical College. Kumamoto University acquired this property and used it as a training facility until the completion of a new workshop in 1970. Eleven extremely valuable machines purchased between the Meiji and Taisho periods were maintained in working condition and designated as important cultural properties along with the building. It has also been recognized as a machine heritage site by the Japan Society of Mechanical Engineers.


Higo liku Museum Location: Honjo Central Campus

This museum collects and exhibits valuable materials to record the traditions and history of medical education provided in the Higo (Kumamoto) area over time. Materials range from those belonging to Saishunkan, a medical school founded by the feudal lord Hosokawa Shigetaka in 1756, to those of the current Kumamoto Jniversity School of Medicine.

Kumayaku Museum

Location: Oe Campus

This museum exhibits valuable materials and rare experimental tools related to the over 130-year history of the School of Pharmacy. It also includes a variety of exhibit areas that introduce visitors to the knowledge of




was established in 1927 as the Medical Plant Garden of the Kumamoto College of Pharmacy, the predecessor of the Faculty of Pharmacy. The garden contains more than 1,500 species of plants, many of which are the original plants of crude drugs listed in the Japanese Pharmacopoeia. The garden has also preserved and cultivated plants originating from the Banshi Garden of the former Hosokawa clan, including Mokugenji, Tendaiyaku, Sanshuyu, Sanzashi, and Ninjinboku.





The Campus Museum logo is designed with the initial letter "M" of "Museum" using the curves and straight lines found in the University's historic buildings. Its design represents that we are open to the community and the world.



Kumamoto University, which has a long history and tradition, has four buildings designated as nationally important cultural properties on its lush green campus, including the Memorial Museum of the Fifth High School. It also possesses valuable materials identified as nationally important cultural properties in its collection, such as documents and objects belonging to the Hosokawa family, lords of the Higo (Kumamoto) domain, deposited by the Eiseibunko Foundation, and documents from the Aso family in the university collection. These materials are being actively used for education and research.

The campus contains a wide-range of museums, such as the Higo Medical Education Museum, which introduced the tradition and history of medical education in Higo, a pioneer in the era, and produced the world-renowned bacteriologist Shibasaburo Kitasato. It also includes the Kumayaku Museum with its medicinal botanical garden, which preserves and nurtures a variety of medicinal and rare plants.

Kumamoto University has also included the Campus Museum Concept in its mid-term vision, that is, the "Kumamoto University Initiative 2030." It intends to actively utilize these valuable historical resources to promote education and research as well as to contribute to the development of education and culture by widely disseminating them to local and international communities and deepening interactions with them.

We hope to create a campus museum where people can visit, learn, enjoy, and talk to each other.

We look forward to welcoming many visitors to the Kumamoto University Campus Museum.

02 Chemical Laboratory of the Fifth High School

This brick building was constructed simultaneously with the Goko Main Building. The laboratories are equipped with draft chambers, which are ventilation devices that harness the updraft generated by lamps to expel harmful fumes. The building has also been recognized as a chemical heritage site by the Chemical Society of Japan.

Omotemon (The Front Gate)

Important Cultural Property

The Omotemon of Goko (The Fifth High School), commonly known as Akamon (The Red Gate), was built simultaneously with the Goko Main Building. The gate, comprising the main pillars and wing walls of brick and natural stone, faces the old Bungo Road (currently prefectural route 337).




